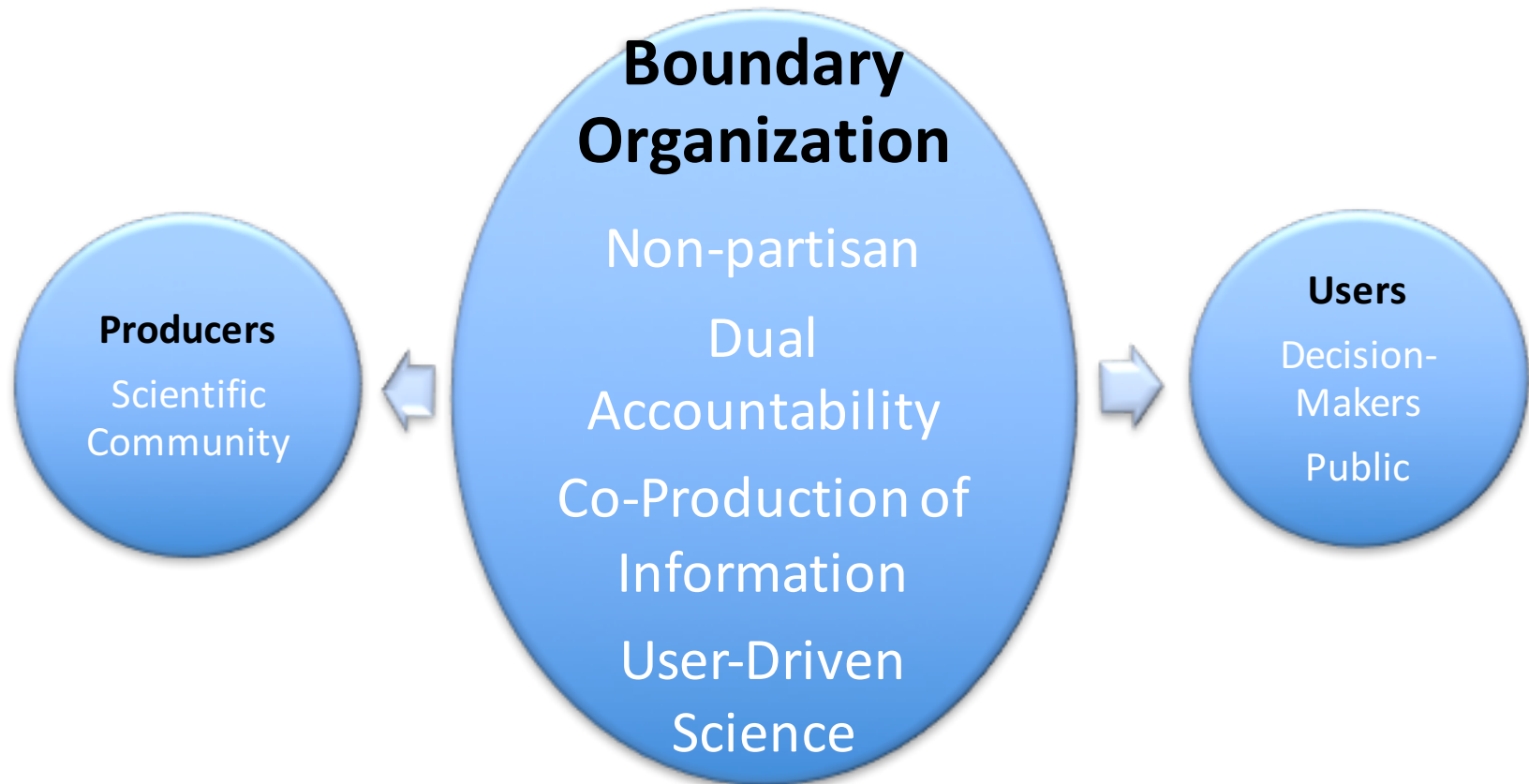

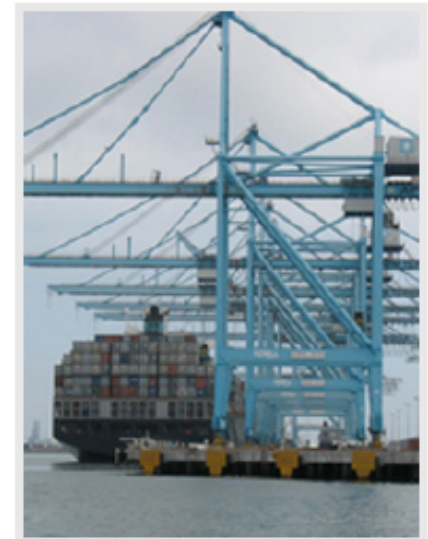


Lessons From Regional Adapt LA

Regional AdaptLA: Coastal Impacts Planning in the Los Angeles Region

Focus Areas > Climate Change > AdaptLA

Los Angeles is known for its wide sandy beaches, coastal boardwalks, and beach commerce and tourism. However the impacts of climate change not only threaten our treasured beaches but also critical infrastructure, including power plants; sewage treatment plants; and two of the busiest ports in the U.S., along the coast. Planning for the impacts of climate change (adaptation planning) is therefore a priority for the region. To fully understand the impacts of climate change and how they can inform regional planning policies require a link between the best available scientific tools and local governments. *Regional AdaptLA: Coastal Impacts Planning in the Los Angeles Region* is a multi-year project that strives to provide this link to local coastal jurisdictions and to develop a community of practice for the L.A. region.
